



Hand washing: We are trying to be a hand washing champion:

How to wash

Hand washing is an important step in keeping us healthy. Help your child build good hand washing habits by demonstrating Handy's 5 steps for clean hands below.



Hand washing for kids

Liquid hand soap spreads and lathers quickly with simple rubbing and water, making it easy for kids to do a good job. Make hand washing fun by having kids time their 20 second hand washing (Step 3) using a watch, or singing the "Twinkle Twinkle Little Star" song.



Wet hands under running water. Add soap.



Rub hands together to make bubbles.



Rub soapy bubbles all around for 20 seconds –on hands, wrists, between fingers and under fingernails.



Rinse hands under running water.



Dry hands well with a clean towel.

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

On closer inspection we found a small slug!! Reflections on Being a Parent: All parents have different parenting styles and different thoughts and ideas may be what works for you and your family, while others do not feel right or these reflect the type of parent you want to be for your children. These are just some thoughts to reflect on and consider, especially if you are thinking what else can I do or I have tried everything!! These thoughts are framed around the concept of compassionate parenting. Remember you are always learning on the job as a parent (my thanks to all specialists who have inspired these thoughts).



Compassionate parents are able to see beneath the surface of their children's behavior to get at the deeper motivations. They empower children to control their own behavior by teaching them to regulate their motivations and understand their feelings, and how this impacts others. Listen to your children as much as possible, let solutions to problems come from them. As they mature, your job is less to give answers and more and more to ask the questions that lead them to solutions. Take care to respond to positive emotions as well as negative behaviors. Otherwise, you set up the habit of using trouble to get attention. Compassionate attention to expressions of interest and enjoyment are opportunities to develop positive emotional response in children. Discipline must be considered with positive parental motivation to protect, nurture, encourage, influence, guide, or cooperate. Remember changing behaviours can be a long term project and you are often all learning together. Try to focus on what behaviours you want to occur, not what you don't want. Give short, clear instructions. Try using a quiet voice sometimes and sometimes humour can be just what is required to save the day. Remember behavior is the way children communicate; ask what are they telling me?

We look forward to seeing everyone at the Bundjil nest event and please join us in the program whenever you can- we are now in term 4 and sadly it will go all too quickly. We look forward to sharing these special times with all our families, any questions please ask.

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Manameet and Gareeal News - October 2017

We celebrated a lovely sunny end of Term 3 down at the wetlands. A change to our Coolart plans, but the pond was full of tadpoles and we thought it was too great a learning opportunity for the children to miss.

The children loved fishing for tadpoles and quickly discovered they were quick! They took their time to watch them in the water and experiment with different ways to catch them. Children shared ideas and listened to peers and adults' suggestions. The ones we caught we investigated up close in the tubs before gently putting them back into their home to grow. We noticed that they were very small, a dark black / brown colour and had a long tail but we couldn't see any legs on them like frogs have. We wondered when they might get legs and turn into We learnt about how to be safe near the water and followed the instructions so we could all enjoy our time by the pond.























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We enjoyed our snacks out in nature. Manameet ate with the tadpoles and we found a lovely shady spot near the pond under trees with Gareeal. We noticed when we were quiet that we could hear the frogs in the distance.

Whilst walking on Boon Wurrung Country we talked about the changes we could see and hear. We noticed daisies in the field next to kinder, that the witchety finger tree was still alive even though it had fallen down a 'long' time ago and that the muddy puddles had almost gone. In the wetlands we also found something that sparked our interest. Was it a nest for a bird? Was it an old fire? Was it a house? We shared our thoughts together and decided to leave the pile of sticks and twigs as we found it.

We will carry on with our learning of tadpoles in Term 4 this Friday in kinder. The second week of Term 4 we will go for another walk to the wetlands to see how the tadpoles have changed!
